
Coming to terms with Photography



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
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
Spitified: Coffee Table Book Launch



Graduated Filters



Radial Filters

Radial filters offer a way to make localised adjustments within a circular or oval area. Here is how to make the most of this feature:



1. Accessing the Radial Filter Tool

Select the Radial Filter tool from the Develop module toolbar. Click and drag to create an ellipse, defining the area where adjustments will be applied.

2. Selective Enhancements for Your Subject

Use radial filters to draw attention to your subject by brightening or adding sharpness to the area. In portrait photography, apply radial filters to em-

phasise facial features or create a soft vignette.

3. Creative Effects and Vignettes

Apply radial filters for creative effects, such as adding a soft glow or vignetting. Experiment with inverting the mask to apply adjustments outside the defined area.

Brushes and Presets

Brushes

Lightroom's adjustment brushes allow for precise, localised edits. Mastering this tool opens up a world of creativity.

1. Accessing the Adjustment Brush Tool

Navigate to the Develop module and select the Adjustment Brush tool from the toolbar.

2. Creating Custom Brushes for Local Adjustments



3. Creating and Saving Your Own Presets

Develop your unique style by creating and saving custom presets. Save time by applying your presets to batches of photos with similar lighting conditions.


Consumer Electronic Imaging Fair, Mumbai 2024
