

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

An insightful interview with the acclaimed cinematographer, Nalla Muthu. Our editor, Anil Khubani, had the exceptional opportunity to sit down with Mr. Muthu during his recent visit to the vibrant city of Jaipur. Renowned for his extraordinary ability to capture the essence of life through his lens, Nalla Muthu has carved a niche in the world of cinematography with his distinctive style and innovative approach.

In this exclusive interview, Nalla Muthu opens up about his journey in the film industry, sharing anecdotes from his illustrious career, the challenges he has faced, and the inspirations that have shaped his work. His profound understanding of visual storytelling and his dedication to his craft are evident in every frame he shoots, making him a revered figure among peers and audiences alike.

Anil Khubani's engaging conversation with Nalla Muthu delves into the intricacies, providing readers with a rare glimpse into the mind of a master cinematographer. This interview is not just a testament to Nalla Muthu's remarkable talent but also a celebration of the art of cinematography itself. Some excerpts from the Interview.

Q1. Can you tell us about your journey into wildlife cinematography and what inspired you to specialise in this field?

I graduated in Cinematography from the Chennai Film Institute in 1986. I started my career in the Tamil feature film industry and then worked as a high-speed cameraman at ISRO in Sriharikota. After that, I worked at a film institute and various government agencies.

However, I wanted to do something more fulfilling than a fixed job. Being in Delhi, I had the chance to work with different production houses just as private TV channels were emerging, creating opportunities for travel shows, automobile shows, religious shows, and multi-camera shows.

Eventually, I got to work on international documentaries, including wildlife cinematography. This experience allowed me to tell stories from an international perspective, which was different from the usual Indian perspective.

In 2007, I decided to become an independent cinematographer, focusing on wildlife because it allowed me to shoot and tell stories on my own. Despite the lack of funding and commissions, I invested my own resources to make films. My journey in wildlife photography began in Ranthambore, driven by the desire to create independent films that tell Indian stories to an international audience.

Q2. Any relationship between Photography & Cinematography? On the other hand, how are they similar?

Cinematography is essentially an extension of still photography. I started as a still photographer before joining the institute, where they taught basic photography, including static and still photography.

Nowadays, both still photography and cinematography are quite similar because, at the end of the day, both should tell a story. Whether it is a single photograph or a series of images put together in a sequence, the goal is storytelling.

Cinematography adds elements like audio and music to cre-

ate a more immersive experience. It involves filming in a professional, cinematic way with higher-quality formats. Cinema, being a form of entertainment, aims to tell stories to a larger audience, making it more engaging compared to just providing information.

Q3. Wildlife photography often involves dealing with unpredictable subjects. How do you prepare yourself technically and mentally for a shoot in such environments?

Shooting wildlife means dealing with unpredictable subjects and environments. To prepare mentally, you need to focus on storytelling, which is crucial in film photography as a free-lancer. Over the years, I have realised that personal stories resonate the most. Award-winning films, like 'My Octopus Teacher,' showcase this by following a single character's journey.

In my work, I follow characters, like a tiger and her cubs, throughout their life cycle. This approach means the storyline can change daily. You cannot have a fixed plot; instead, you keep multiple potential storylines in mind. For instance, you might track the survival of tiger cubs, considering different scenarios like the dominance or weakness of each cub.

This process involves adapting to changes and letting the story develop organically over time. After months or even years, you refine your narrative based on what you have captured.

Preparation involves being mentally and physically ready to capture key moments that tell a story. You need to think about how each shot fits into a sequence and where it leads.

This way, you can create a cohesive narrative. Ultimately,

whether it is still photography or cinematography, the goal is effective storytelling. You need to be prepared to seize those moments that can convey a compelling story.

Q4. Can you share your go-to camera and lens setup for capturing tigers in their natural habitat?

A common question people ask is what camera setup is best for shooting tigers or wildlife. The answer depends on the purpose. Today, there are different cameras for different needs: weddings, cinema, social media, and more. It is essential to know what you want to achieve with your camera.

If you are shooting for broadcast, you need a camera that meets broadcaster specifications. For feature-length films or OTT platforms, each has its own requirements. For social media or YouTube, the needs are different. In wildlife photography, it is crucial to use high-end formats because they have a long shelf life and can be used later. However, high-end cameras are expensive, and wildlife filmmaking is costly, especially since there is little financial support in our country.

I suggest starting with a good second-hand camera or hiring equipment if you have a limited budget. Investing in cameras and lenses can be expensive, especially for wildlife photography where you might spend weeks or months in the field. Renting can save costs.

For professional work, investing in high-quality lenses is im-

portant. However, for many projects, even smartphones like iPhones can produce great films if the story is compelling. The technology is constantly evolving, so always consider the purpose and your budget before making a decision.

Q5. What are some of the key challenges while capturing Wildlife?

When preparing to shoot wildlife, it's important to be ready for the challenges you'll face. Over the past 20 to 30 years, I have learned that the key challenges are capturing the right moment and getting access to the best locations. Often, it is better to visit offbeat places that are less crowded and cheaper.

Focusing on one particular subject or species can help you tell a compelling story. Randomly clicking images will not work; instead, follow a specific animal, like a tiger, crocodile, or bird, and document its behaviour. This approach allows you to create a coherent narrative rather than just a montage of random photos.

To succeed in wildlife photography and cinematography, you should look for something unique or never captured before. This could be a rare behaviour or an unusual setting. Even if you do not capture it perfectly, the attempt itself can be a story. For instance, if people say tigers only mate in winter, try to capture it in summer.

Avoid crowded tourist parks where everyone takes the same photos. Going solo can help you capture something extraordinary. Solo photographers often come back with unique stories, images because they isolate themselves, and focus on their subject.

Ultimately, it is about creating a personal and unique story. Do not reveal your location until you have the content, and then share it to create a wow factor. This approach keeps people eagerly waiting for your next image or story.

For small photographers and filmmakers, it's crucial to look for the extraordinary and tell stories in new and interesting ways.

Q6. How do you manage to get the perfect exposure and sharpness in such conditions?

When shooting wildlife, the lighting can be very unpredictable. You might start early in the morning and face clouds or

harsh sunlight. To manage this and get perfect exposure and sharp images, here is what I do:

I mostly use prime lenses, which provide sharper images. I avoid zoom lenses because they can complicate things. My teacher used to say not to overuse zoom lenses, as it can distract from the photography process.

In terms of lighting, thanks to modern technology, shooting in RAW format is a game changer. RAW allows for many adjustments in post-production, so I do not worry too much about perfect lighting at the moment. Capturing the right moment is more important than perfect lighting. Even if an image is slightly blurred or not perfectly sharp, it can still tell a powerful story.

I prefer using manual focus and manual exposure. After years of practice, it becomes muscle memory. This way, I can quickly adjust focus and exposure on the spot. Modern cameras also have great latitude, meaning minor exposure issues can be corrected later.

It is also important to break the rules sometimes. For instance, when everyone is shooting with the light, I try to shoot against it. This can create unique backlit shots that stand out. Understanding the basic principles of photography is important, but knowing how to bend them can lead to more interesting and unique images.

In summary, focus on capturing the moment, use RAW format for flexibility, trust your muscle memory with manual settings, and don't be afraid to break the rules to get unique shots.

Q7. How do you ensure the safety and ethical treatment of wildlife while capturing your shots?

Safety is crucial in wildlife photography. People often ask if I have had any bad encounters with tigers, but I have not. Wild animals are generally safe if you respect their space and do not disturb them. Always keep a safe distance, as you are in their territory.

If a tiger comes close to your camera, it is unavoidable. To capture movements safely, use long lenses or devices like camera traps and infrared cameras. The approach varies with each animal, but disturbing him or her never works.

In terms of ethics, always give animals their space. Observe and capture moments like a spy in the jungle. If you act like a spy_keeping a low profile, using hides, or setting up camera traps_you will get the best shots without disrupting the animals. Following this approach ensures you automatically adhere to ethical practices in wildlife photography.

Q8. Any particular memorable experience that you want to share?

Experience-wise, being a wildlife cinematographer means witnessing a lot of memorable moments in the forest. Every day, you see a mix of life and death_a kill here, a birth there. These sights become a part of your everyday life.

The most memorable experiences for me are the emotional moments, especially between a mother tiger and her cubs.

For example, in 2019, I observed Krishna, a tigress in Ranthambore, trying to maintain her territory. She had three

cubs: two daughters and one son. The son eventually left, but the daughters stayed and challenged her for the territory.

Krishna fought with her daughters, and after many days, she fed them one last time before leaving. This rare moment of a mother feeding her almost-grown cubs was unforgettable. Another memorable moment was with a tiger named Machli. I followed her for years and was there during her last moments. Seeing a wild animal take its last breath was a profound experience.

These encounters are not about attacks or danger but about the deep emotional connections and natural behaviours, I witness. There are many such moments, and each one is unique and special.

Q9. What advice would you give to aspiring wildlife photographers who are just starting out?

My advice for aspiring photographers and filmmakers is to focus on storytelling and developing your unique style. Today, almost everyone can afford a camera, which is a great advantage. However, the landscape has changed significantly, especially for professionals. Traditional television has declined, and even TV channels are shifting to OTT platforms, which often require long series rather than one-off documentaries.

Social media platforms like YouTube, Facebook, and Instagram offer new opportunities. However, it is easy to fall into the trap of creating monotonous short films. Instead, focus on learning the art of storytelling. This can be done through

film schools, but it is not strictly necessary. Many resources

are available online, and you can learn a lot by practising and experimenting.

Creating engaging content is key. It does not have to be long, but it should be interesting and well-crafted. You can build your own channel and grow your audience over time. Success may come slowly, but a dedicated audience will appreciate your work.

Avoid shortcuts like using borrowed footage or quickly throwing together content just for views. These methods are not sustainable and do not build a loyal audience. Instead, take your time to create meaningful stories, even if they are just a few minutes long. Consistency and quality will pay off in the long run.

In today's fast-paced world, many young creators want to become famous overnight. While it might be possible, it is not a sustainable approach. Focus on the long-term, and aim to tell stories that resonate with people.

Q10. How important is patience and persistence in wildlife photography?

Patience and passion are crucial for wildlife photography. Passion is essential because it drives you to keep going, even when things do not happen as expected. However, passion should not turn into madness, where you are just clicking photos and posting them on social media for quick praise.

Many people nowadays buy expensive cameras on instalments and spend weekends taking photos just to get likes. They rush to post these photos without even reviewing them properly. This is not the right approach. True passion means dedicating time and effort to your work, not just seeking validation online.

Patience is also key. It is not about waiting endlessly but about waiting for the right moment to capture the perfect shot. Bursting shots in quick succession might give you one good photo, but it does not make you a professional. It is better to wait and capture a single, meaningful moment.

For example, a famous photo of Machli, the tiger, fighting a

crocodile was taken by a photographer who had limited film. He had to be patient and wait for the perfect moment, capturing it with just a few shots. This kind of patience and skill is what sets true professionals apart.

In summary, focus on your passion, but do not let it turn into a rush for quick approval. Develop patience and wait for the right moments. This will lead to more meaningful and professional work in the long run.

Q11. How would you like Nalla Muthu to be remembered, or what should people know you for?

I want people to remember me, not for who I am, but for the stories that I tell.

Every moment I capture is self-funded, driven by my passion, and not by commissions. I have managed my work independently, sometimes even having to borrow to fund my projects. What matters most to me is that people remember the moments I have captured and the emotional stories those images convey.

For example, many people tell me how my sequences have made them cry. That is the essence of being a storyteller_it is about capturing and sharing emotions. I want my work to be remembered for its ability to tell profound, emotional stories through the moments I have preserved.


Reflecting on the past 30 years, I have learned that not every sequence will go as planned, and sometimes the moments you least expect to be significant turn out to be the most impactful. It is all about destiny. You cannot capture everything, but what you do capture can tell a great story.

For instance, the story of Machali, a tigress, became significant only after capturing her final moments. Following a character for years and waiting for the right moment to tell their story is crucial. Patience is key in wildlife photography. There were times I did not spot a tiger for days, but I never lost hope. Moreover, when that perfect moment finally arrived, it made all the waiting worthwhile.

Observing tigers has taught me invaluable lessons about patience and timing. Just as a tiger waits for the right moment to strike, as a photographer, you must wait for the right moment to capture. This patience and focus are essential not just in photography but in life. When the right opportunity comes, seize it without hesitation.

Tigers also teach us about strategy and purpose. They calculate every move, considering various factors before making a kill. Similarly, in life and photography, one must think and plan carefully. The lessons from observing tigers have helped me immensely in my work and personal life.

In summary, I want people to remember the emotional and powerful stories that I tell. These stories, backed by patience, focus, and strategic thinking, are what make my work meaningful and memorable.

creativity and dedication of the club's members, and as an inspiration for others to explore their own photographic journeys.


Honouring the Participants
